Director's word

It is with great pride that I present to you the report of our activities. This year was difficult for us all. Like many industries, the financial crisis caused by COVID-19 has hit the philanthropic sector hard across the country. Several organizations are reporting significant drops in their revenues and some do not think they will survive the year 2020. Our revenues were obviously affected but less so then anticipated because of some dedicated volunteers, socially distanced micro events, new fundraising initiatives and strong donor retention. We controlled our expenses trough added value management practices and lowered administrative expenses. We wish we could have reached our budget for scientific spending. Our contractual disbursement for research activities are based on progress and most laboratories and clinical sites activities were halted for a good portion of the year. Our treasury is excellent, our management board



is well balanced and new administrators bring complementary skills. We are able to do much with a small fraction of families and people with ataxia involved. Imagine if we had the full support of all. It is essential that all families affected by ataxia join our cause. We have made significant progress this year and are confident that we can continue to grow. We are still a small organization and need every volunteer and donor.



PARTNERSHIP

We will continue to support research and create partnerships with other foundations, organizations, companies or governments to leverage our research spending.

RESEARCH SITE

The Montreal Collaborative clinical research network in Friedreich's Ataxia (CCRN) site is lead by Dr. Antoine Duquette, a neurologist at the CHUM and his research team. This site is home of a international Natural history study and the starting structure for clinical trials. The impact of COVID on this site was important this year and slowed down the recruitment of patients and in patient visit.

RESEARCH GRANTS

Ataxia Canada funds relevant research where ataxia is the primary symptom and is genetic and progressive in nature. The research grants awarded are normally for a period of one to two years and between 15 000 \$ and 50 \$ 000 CDN as total annual budget allocated, although in exceptional circumstances it may be higher.

CLINICAL TRIALS

The goal is to fund and attract clinical trials in Canada to benefit people with potential treatments that are under development. There are ongoing discussions with pharmaceutical groups for clinical trials.

CREATION OF A SCIENTIFIC COMITEE

Since its inception, the Ataxia Canada Foundation has had the mission of supporting research to contribute to the development of therapies targeting both the causes and the effects of the various forms of ataxia. The pursuit of this goal is still very much alive and topical within the administration and members of the Foundation.

In a context where it is essential for us to invest judiciously and to finance research according to a rigorous and fair process, the establishment of a Scientific Evaluation Committee (SEC) makes perfect sense. The SEC is made up of 3 external members with an interest and expertise in the field of ataxia as well as peer review of research grant applications.

The Scientific Evaluation Committee (SEC)

Ataxia Canada relies on the expertise of its CES to ensure that research grants are evaluated with rigor, fairness and according to the priorities of the Foundation.

His research largely focuses on the genetic basis of neurogenetic disorders with founder effects in Quebec, with an increasing focus on disorders with ataxic manifestations such as Autosomal Recessive Spastic Ataxia of Charlevoix-Saguenay (ARSACS)



Research into genetic causes of hereditary neuromuscular disorders, principally adult-onset conditions including myopathy, neuropathy, and ALS.

More specifically, the CES has the following mandates:

- Evaluate grant applications objectively
- Provide assessments and recommendations to the Foundation's Board of Directors about the quality and scientific merit of the applications
- Suggest external expert resources who can feed the CES 'reflections when evaluating research grant applications.
- Play an advisory role with the Board of Directors (CA) on the selection of research priorities and on the improvement of the grant application evaluation process

SERVICE PROGRAM

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

This program, in connection with our mission, aims to improve the general well-being of people with ataxia by partially funding projects of various sizes for certain assistive devices, adaptations or equipment. Ataxia Canada has opted for crowd funding, which means that for every accepted application, the foundation will match up to 50% of the money raised by donors and give up to \$5,000 0 so 10 000\$ total per project.




We had our first travel lottery this year were we raised 17 000\$.






